The Senior Constituency Group of the AFL-CIO **1965**—The year the A. Philip Randolph Institute (APRI), a national organization of black trade unionists, was founded by Asa Philip Randolph and Bayard Rustin.

THE MISSION

Randolph (1889-1979) was the greatest black labor leader in American history and the father of the modern American civil rights movement.

Rustin (1912-1987), a leading civil rights and labor activist and strategist, was Randolph's greatest protégé and the organizer of the historic 1963 March on Washington for Jobs and Freedom.

APRI's mission, from our founding to the present, has been to fight for racial equality and economic justice. Our role is unique – we work with black trade unionists, the people best suited to serve as a bridge between labor and the black community.

This Black-Labor Alliance helped the civil rights movement achieve one of its greatest victories, passages of the Voting Rights Act, which removed the last remaining legal barriers to broad black political participation.

Randolph and Rustin founded APRI in 1965 to continue the struggle for social, political and economic justice for all working Americans.
